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LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT Meredith Aldridge



What a year we have had **Creating Connections**! Brené Brown defines connection as "the energy that exists between people when they feel seen, heard, and valued; when they can give and receive without judgment; and when they derive sustenance and strength from the relationship." Throughout the **2018-2019 League year**, we have created connections with our fellow members, our corporate and community partners, and our greater community. In addition to forging connections, we have advanced our mission of promoting voluntarism, developing the potential of women, and improving communities through the effective action of trained volunteers.

We started our League year by focusing on training and service. In partnership with the Women's Foundation of Mississippi, we hosted the first-ever **"She's on Board"** program, an all-day training opportunity for women throughout the community. Our commitment to training continued in 2018-2019 with the addition of a new **Training and Organizational Development** board position and leadership team, missionbased General Membership Meetings, and a **strategic member feedback campaign** designed to enhance future training and planning.

Our service in the community ranged from multiple summer camps to year-round projects centered around advancing the impact areas of **early literacy, children's health**, and the

social development of children and youth. From packing backpacks with nutritious snacks to reading one-on-one with children each week, our volunteers poured their time and energy into the children and youth of the Jackson metro area. With more than **30 projects and initiatives**, our members—and partners—made huge strides in connecting with our shared community.

The League's emphasis on service took a new form in early 2019 with our inaugural **Connecting Communities Day of Service**. For one day, we invited our families, our corporate supporters and community partners, and members of our community to serve with us in **10 simultaneous half-day projects**. Not only did we meet real needs in real time, those who participated in the day of service made genuine, lasting connections.

All of our mission-based efforts were made possible through the generous support of our corporate and individual supporters at our three fund development events: **Mistletoe Marketplace**, **Junior League Jumble**, and **Touch A Truck® Jackson**. Collectively, these businesses raised more than \$1.2 million to support the mission of the League. Jumble and Touch A Truck® included significant community components, including Jumble's Pile O' Pants collection and community partner donations and Touch A Truck®'s Field Trip Friday and UNPLUGGED, our newly-implemented quiet hour for children facing sensory sensitivities.

As the 2018-2019 League year came to a close, we celebrated the signing of **Senate Bill 2955**, which will provide the League with a sales tax exemption beginning July 1. This legislation will allow the League to make a **significantly larger impact** in our community through estimated savings of \$55,000-60,000 annually. Not only can we buy more and do more with these savings, we can connect more.

Reflecting on this year, my favorite moment was pausing to enjoy the connections being made on our day or service, knowing that we were **building up our communities and creating future leaders**. To those who support us and help us advance our mission, I thank you. To our members, I will cherish all we have done together to support one another and improve our shared community.

PROJECT HIGHLIGHT: Boys and Girls Club Makeover

JLJ volunteers worked throughout the summer and fall to renovate the library at the Boys and Girls Club Walker Unit. League volunteers were tasked with the job of designing a calm, nurturing, and educational space for the Boys and Girls Club members.

"As the director opened the classroom door and flipped on the lights, four features stood out: bright yellow walls, mismatched worn carpet squares, broken bookcases, and cramped "We lived the JLJ mission by developing each volunteer's potential. work stations. With a team of hardworking and dedicated JLJ volunteers, we established a design plan and got busy," said project chair Laura Elizabeth Tate.

The team worked with Early Literacy Management Team Chair Lacey Bergin and Community Vice President Katie Browning to hire contractors to repair a severely damaged section of wall and build a custom unit of bookshelves and cabinets for use by the children and instructors. Since the makeover volunteers had no interaction with the children who would benefit from their work during the project, the Reveal Party was a particularly special time for the makeover volunteers. "Seeing the joy and wonder in each child's reaction to their new classroom made the project's impact real," said Tate.

PROJECT HIGHLIGHT:

Camp Connections

Fifteen JLJ volunteers served more than 750 children this year through the League's new flexible project, Camp Connections. They assisted the JLJ summer camps and worked with five additional initiatives focused on early literacy, including Stewpot's Lunch-n-Learn, Operation Shoestring's Summer Reading Program, Backpack Buddies, and the Mississippi Children's Museum's Readers to Leaders program.

With the Stewpot Lunch-n-Learn initiative, JLJ volunteers provided lunch and educational activities for Stewpot's children and adolescent camp participants during two weeks of the summer.

Likewise, Operation Shoestring's Summer Reading Program allowed volunteers to equip rising kindergarten, first and second-grade students with important reading comprehension skills, in addition to two books that participants were able to take home to practice their new skills.

Making sure that Jackson Public School students have the tools needed for a successful school year was the primary goal of the Backpack Buddies initiative. JLJ volunteers purchased the school supplies and packed backpacks for elementary school students; this year, 400 students from four area JPS schools received a backpack stocked with essentials.

Camp Connections volunteers also assisted with the Mississippi Children's Museum's "Readers to Leaders" program, which rewards JPS students who met their summer reading goals.

Projects use strategies that provide access to nutritional foods and increase knowledge on the benefits of healthy eating and being physically active. PROJECT HIGHLIGHT: R.E.A.C.H.

The hospital can be scary, especially for children, but one Junior League of Jackson project is doing its part to make it a happier, more comfortable place for Batson Children's Hospital's pediatric patients.

The Recreation, Enrichment and Assistance for Children's Health (R.E.A.C.H.) project is an opportunity for JLJ volunteers to enrich the lives of children receiving extensive medical care at Children's of Mississippi at the University of Mississippi Medical Center. JLJ volunteers staff the hospital's third and fourth-floor playrooms and play games with the children, throw

parties, and participate in other fun activities, enriching the lives of the patients and making their hospital stay a little less stressful. In addition to providing companionship to the children, volunteers also support the families, who are often unable to stay with them at all times.

PROJECT HIGHLIGHT: McClean Fletcher

A common misconception is that the McClean Fletcher Center Outreach, Grief Support and Food Projects is a sad placement, but volunteers continue to find joy in serving.

"As a volunteer you make such an impact here," said project chair Lee Herrin, who's been actively volunteering with the center for five years. "Yes, there are children there dealing with sad things, but this is a place where they come to belong to a group, and our volunteers get the honor of being a small part of that."

Skilled professionals at the McClean Fletcher Center train JLJ volunteers to provide grief support to families who have experienced the death of a loved one. Volunteers then work to encourage caregivers and children, ages 4 to 18, in positive ways to process their grief and grow through their experiences.

The center, a division of Hospice Ministries and Mississippi's only grief center geared directly toward children, provides counseling for children in a group environment that Herrin describes as nonintimidating and even fun. The children can talk about their loved ones and keep their memory alive in this place without judgement from peers, because everyone there has lost someone.

"I've seen families drive for hours to get their kids to the center because they love it so much. Every child there has lost someone, and it bonds them together in a meaningful way," Herrin said.

PROJECT HIGHLIGHT: Making Connections and Rewarding Success

Connections are key to the success of the Making Connections and Rewarding Success project.

League volunteers serving at the CARES School, supported by Canopy Children's Solutions, operate a merit-based store for the benefit of students, ages 6 to 18, to encourage positive behavior and decision making. Volunteers forge connections with the students, encourage "This project is heartwarming in so many ways. I have lots of good memories, but one stands out. A boy, who had trouble earning enough per week to buy much-if anything-in the store, finally had a good week. That first week when he had earned enough to shop, he chose to 'purchase' lotion for his mother!"

them to meet and exceed their personal behavior and therapy goals, and consistently offer positive reinforcement. In addition to running the store, JLJ volunteers welcome new students with care packages and assist with holiday gatherings.

"I love watching the students work hard and have good behavior in order to make 'money' to spend at the store," said Quinn Kellum, project chair. "It's also fun to see when a child saves up for a few weeks for an item that they have put on their wish list. For these kids, it can be a bright spot getting something to call their own that they earned."

PROJECT HIGHLIGHT:

Sensory Fun and Learning

There is no shortage of opportunities for fun or learning in the League's newest social development community project: Sensory Fun and Learning.

JLJ volunteers provide sensory activities for children with special needs, ranging from 6 weeks to 6 years of age, at the Little Light House during this school-year project. Volunteers incorporate various learning experiences into play and fun projects, allowing the children to focus on social, emotional, and educational development.

Because the children have special needs, extracurricular activities are not always readily available. The Sensory Fun and Learning project fills that void, creating a connection between the Junior League of Jackson, the Little Light House, and its students, said Social Development Management Team Chair Sabrina Ruffin.

"This project is important on several levels: first and foremost, to provide a safe and comfortable place for these children to come while their parents attend meetings or have a respite night," said project chair Dorothy Wofford.

Education is a key component to this particular project. Volunteers are trained in performing sensory-integration projects tailored to the children's individual needs in order to give them an appropriate level of stimulus, while their parents and guardians attend an education and training series organized by the school.

"We have had so many great memories. The little ones are the biggest, though: the students that just want to be cuddled and rocked, the incredible joy in their eyes from one-on-one attention during a game of peek-a-boo, or the times when the parents take an extra second to thank us with a slight enough pause that makes you know how much it meant to them," Wofford said.

doubled their investment in these young campers. The camp, which is offered at Calvary Baptist Church, gives volunteers an opportunity to engage children, ages 5 to 10, in an explosion of educational and interactive activities.

This year, Arts Explosion was a hit with a Dr. Seuss-themed week, and volunteers also helped teach nutritious eating habits and served breakfast and lunch to each camper. Sixty campers participated in educational activities centered around art, music, movement, dance, and drama at the weeklong summer camp. "I loved seeing the children shine," said project chair Allison Weems. "They worked all week on their performance, and they had such joy getting to perform for their parents and show off their displayed artwork."

According to Weems, the camp not only impacted the children but also the League volunteers. "These children will touch your heart," Weems said. "They love being at camp, and this camp gives them an opportunity they may not otherwise have."

JPS Summer Camp

Most children count down the days until school is out for the summer, but thanks to the Junior League of Jackson's JPS Summer Camp, 60 rising third and fourth-grade students looked forward to returning to the classroom.

"There was a huge transformation in the children, from the moment they timidly walked through the door of Pecan Park Elementary School for camp Monday morning, to Friday afternoon when those sweet little souls were hugging our necks so hard because they didn't want camp to be over. You could literally see the changes taking place in the week we got to spend with them!" said project chair Allison Young.

After feeding the campers breakfast, JLJ volunteers led the group in supplemental math, reading, language arts, STEM, and social studies lessons. Each day at lunch, the campers enjoyed a different speaker, including Dorian the magician, the health and wellness team (and Zumba dancers!) from Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Mississippi, and representatives from the Jackson Zoo. A camp favorite was water day, when students got to cut loose and make a splash on inflatable water slides during a PE session.

Young says the campers helped her see the deep impact the camp has on them.

"I wastalking to one little boy one morning and asked him what he wanted to be when he grew up. The camp theme this year was 'Superheroes in Training' and, with the boy's age, I expected him to reply 'Superman,' 'Spiderman,' or one of the other exciting superheroes. I was surprised when he answered 'teacher,'" explained Young.

"He said, 'I want to be a teacher when I grow up so I can come back and teach this camp like you.' It hit me then that we, as JLJ volunteers, make more of an impression on these young minds than we realize."

Super Saturday

PROJECT HIGHLIGHT:

Destination Education

Holding one large joint project at the end of their Provisional year allowed the League's newest members to serve in the community after completing a year of training and learning about the mission and structure of the League. A departure from years past when Provisionals completed their service component through a series of mini-projects, many of which occurred before their League training began, this change to the Provisional timeline was made in an effort to better equip Provisionals with the knowledge they needed before their service to the community commenced.

The Provisional project's goal was to bring awareness to and support local community partners and, more importantly, positively impact the children who attended the event. Visitors to the Destination Education event received a "passport" that was stamped as they participated in interactive stations focused on the League's impact areas of early literacy, children's health, and the social development of children and youth. At the end of the event, children with a filled passport were rewarded with summer reading books for the upcoming school year.

TRAINING AND LEADERSHIP OPPORTUNITIES

Connecting with Our Members

While voluntarism and civic engagement are the lifeblood of the Junior League of Jackson, also at the heart of the organization is its commitment to developing the potential of its members and encouraging and facilitating leadership and training opportunities. The League offered a number of leadership and training opportunities throughout the year, including Membership Training and Development sessions on topics such as women's health, organizational tips, and personal finance.

In addition to League leadership opportunities made available through the Early Leadership Interest Indicator (ELII) and the Final Leadership Interest Indicator (FLII), the League actively encouraged leadership in outside organizations. During the 2018-2019 League year, the League participated in the inaugural "She's on Board" event, a women's board training program; hosted two community roundtables; and engaged members on leadership and training topics through a feedback campaign. The League further affirmed its dedication to developing the potential of women by creating a board position for the express purpose of enhancing and increasing membership training opportunities.

New Training VP Position

This year, the League added a new position, Training and Organizational Development Vice President, to its Board of Directors. The League's five-year Strategic Plan identified a need for the new position, and Extended Active Katherine Bryant served in the inaugural role. Nicknamed the "TOD VP," the Training and Organizational Development Vice President's job is to streamline and enhance existing training programs, identify opportunities for growth, and craft a curriculum to strategically develop leaders for the League and beyond.

Connecting at General Meetings

As part of the year's focus on creating connections, the League used its General Membership Meetings as an opportunity to reconnect members to the League's mission. Mission-based General Meetings gave members the opportunity to hear from a number of renowned speakers. In September, Dr. Jimmy Abraham, former director of enrollment at Mississippi State University and former executive director of the MSU Alumni Association, discussed the individual and collective impact we can make through service. Members heard from Tycely Williams, Vice President for Development for the YWCA and the first woman of color to serve as the president of the Junior League of Washington, D.C., at our February meeting. In April, members were treated to an encore presentation by Dima Ghawi, our community roundtable speaker. In addition to hearing from local and national leaders, members had opportunities to share connections in small group settings at the League's October and December General Meetings.

Training Our Emerging Leaders

The Emerging Leaders program is a year-long intensive leadership training program for up-and-coming leaders in the League. This year, 13 women participated in the program, which was led by chair Stacey Carter and cochair Leann Stamper and guided by sustaining advisor Rita Wray. Selected by the Nominating Committee following an application process, our Emerging Leaders committed to a year of leadership training and development, with a curriculum covering everything from our community impact model to cultural competencies. The program followed a business school approach, with lectures from experts followed by real-world application. The group also participated in a mini-makeover of the JPS Partners in Education (PIE) Store.





She's on Board

In 2018, the Women's Foundation of Mississippi, in partnership with the Junior League of Jackson and Balch & Bingham LLP, introduced a new leadership program for all Mississippi women interested in board service. This board governance and training program's goal was to equip women with the tools they need to succeed and lead in the boardroom. More than 120 women attended the day-long training at Junior League Headquarters on June 8, 2018, where a panel of experts covered topics ranging from the duties and responsibilities of board members to an introduction to nonprofit finance.

"The feedback from the training was overwhelmingly positive, and there is definitely an appetite for this type of offering," said Frances Croft, JLJ Sustaining member and director of strategic initiatives for the Women's Foundation of Mississippi. "Women came away feeling confident to step into a board role–or more confident in one they already had."

Save the date! The second-annual "She's on Board" training program will be held June 21, 2019, at JLJ Headquarters.

Community Roundtables

The League traditionally invites its community partners and supporters to two community roundtables each year, in an effort to connect leaders in the community and facilitate important conversations. The League's fall outreach event, "Finance 101 for Nonprofits," was held October 5, 2018, at JLJ Headquarters. Panelists Gates Elliot, Michelle Stonestreet, and Michelle Lewis discussed various financial aspects of nonprofit corporations, including fundraising, accounting, and management. Hannah Orlansky, JLJ Community Outreach Chair, emceed the event and asked thoughtful questions of the panel, which spurred great discussion and participation from the audience. Guests shared their experiences as well, which helped build on the collective knowledge of the attendees.

The spring community roundtable, "Connecting to Your Leadership Strengths: Breaking Through Barriers and Overcoming Fears," featured dynamic keynote speaker, award-winning author, and leadership coach, Dima Ghawi. The April 9, 2019, event was an emotional combination of personal stories and inspiring messages. Attendees left the event encouraged to shatter their "vases" of expectation and perfection and to embrace the beauty of their "cracks," the experiences and decisions that make them who they are.

Diversity and Inclusion training

This year, the League continued its focus on diversity and inclusion by further integrating D&I training into its meetings and existing training requirements. As part of its mission-based General Membership Meetings, the League focused on embracing inclusion and learning from individual experiences. From member testimonials to a trailblazer series, members heard how individuals can create opportunities for inclusion and overcoming biases. As a tangible reminder of the League's continued commitment to equipping its members to better serve in the community, the League increased cultural competency training through its community partners and instituted the requirement that all members participate in an annual training designed to ensure cultural competence. Finally, the League established a scholarship fund to confidentially assist those members for whom dues could serve as a barrier to continued membership.







Connecting Communities DAY OF SERVICE

Martin Luther King, Jr. said, "Life's most persistent and urgent question is, 'What are you doing for others?'"

On January 21, 2019, more than 500 volunteers donated their time and energy to the cause of serving others at the Junior League of Jackson's inaugural Connecting Communities Day of Service. In collaboration with Jackson Public Schools, Revitalize Mississippi, Operation Shoestring, HIS Heart Ministries at Calvary Baptist Church, Canopy Children's Solutions, and Stewpot, volunteers participated in 10 half-day projects throughout the Jackson metro area on Martin Luther King, Jr. Day. Unlike most League projects, where volunteers must be League members, the Connecting Communities Day of Service was designed to engage our greater community and provide service opportunities for our corporate sponsors, community partners, friends, family, and supporters. For those who could not volunteer their time, the League provided opportunities to donate money and supplies in support of the Day of Service.

When I think of the Day of Service, the word 'impactful' comes to mind. Seeing the amount of donations made and the number of people willing to volunteer reminds us that most people want to help when and where they can. Watching our youngest volunteers deliver thank you notes and boxes of goodies to first responders was impactful. Hearing volunteers from several of the projects say, 'Next year we...' was impactful. The smiles, hugs, and seeing virtual strangers work together to improve the lives of others was impactful. The tears in the eyes of the Executive Director of Catholic Charities when we opened the U-Haul and she saw how much love was in our luggage donations—now, that was impactful. "Our hope for this day was that our members, partners, and supporters would have an opportunity to create connections with one another while serving our community. In just one day, we were able to meet 10 specific needs in our community, but the connections made will last well beyond this one day of service."

THANK YOU, FIRST RESPONDERS – Approximately 130 volunteers as young as 5 years old wrote thank you notes to first responders. Children and teenagers then decorated boxes used to store almost 4,000 snacks for first responders, and the boxes and handwritten notes were delivered to police precincts and fire stations throughout the Jackson metro area.

LUGGAGE OF LOVE – Volunteers packed approximately 150 pieces of luggage with toiletries for foster children and victims of domestic violence in the Hinds County area. Additionally, nearly 900 bags of personal care items were packed and donated by volunteers.





ART FROM THE HEART – Volunteers as young as 12 cleaned the HeARTworks art studio and stocked and organized the art supplies. HeARTworks, an art ministry of Stewpot, provides Stewpot's clients with a creative outlet and opportunity to share their talents at an annual art show.

KEEP DOWNTOWN JACKSON BEAUTIFUL – More than 75 teenage volunteers cleaned the neighborhood surrounding Stewpot Community Services, which included landscaping, disposing of garbage, and cleaning building exteriors. Following the project, Stewpot teens had the opportunity to hear a message of perseverance and hope from Freedom Rider, Hezekiah Watkins.

REVITALIZE WEST JACKSON – Approximately 30 volunteers helped clean and landscape vacant lots near the Rosemont Community Park so that the area can later be converted to landscaped community space. Volunteers put out pine straw and participated in other gardening enhancements.

FILL THE PIE – Volunteers donated toiletry items and school supplies for the Jackson Public Schools' Partners in Education (PIE) store. Additionally, volunteers sorted and packaged school supplies and uniforms at the PIE store, which provides free classroom supplies to JPS teachers.

POWER OF POSITIVITY – Approximately 20 volunteers cleaned and painted the courtyard area outside the Jackson Public Schools District Office. JPS is one of the League's oldest community partners, and each year JLJ volunteers participate in multiple projects with JPS.

SERVICE FROM THE HEART – Volunteers cleaned, painted, and decorated the hallways and doors of the children's wing at Calvary Baptist Church. Volunteers also organized the tutoring and supply closets and made the spaces more functional and welcoming for children in the West Park Community.

SPREAD A LITTLE SUNSHINE – Volunteers painted inspirational messages on the walls at Canopy Children's Solutions, reinforcing the children's value and self-worth. Approximately 20 volunteers focused on personal, special touches to make a lasting impact on the Canopy residents' physical and emotional wellness. Canopy residents also received donated toiletry items.

I WILL SURVIVE – Designed just for JLJ volunteers, this project reinforced the notion that everyone has value and something to offer in support of our community. JLJ volunteers worked alongside local fourth and fifth-grade students to create survival kits and activity packs that were distributed to local community organizations.





















2018-2019 Highlights

SPRING LUNCHEON

The Junior League of Jackson's Spring Luncheon was held May 9, 2019, at the Country Club of Jackson. The annual event celebrated all of the work done by the League over the past year. As is tradition, at the end of the luncheon members watched the passing of the gavel from 2018-2019 JLJ President Meredith Aldridge to 2019-2020 President LaKeysha Greer Isaac.

The event also honored the life and legacy of the Amalie Fair Robinson Sustainer of the Year, Lori Ruffin Newcomb. Named in honor of the first president of the Junior League of Jackson, the Sustainer of the Year Award annually recognizes a Sustaining member who has visibly made a difference in the community through leadership and voluntarism. On hand to receive the award for Newcomb, a former JLJ Board member and Bargain Boutique chair who lost her battle with ovarian cancer earlier this year, were her husband Chris and three children, along with her parents and in-laws. Her daughter, Madison, accepted the award on behalf of the family.

JLJ RECOGNIZED AS OUTSTANDING COMMUNITY PARTNER

On January 24, 2019, the Junior League of Jackson received the Boys and Girls Clubs of Central Mississippi's Volunteer of the Year Award. Specifically, the League was honored for its BGCCM Library Makeover Project. JLJ President Meredith Aldridge, along with project chair, Laura Elizabeth Tate, and cochair, Lindy Brown, accepted the award on behalf of the League.

CHAMPION OF DIVERSITY AWARD

In November 2018, the Association of Fundraising Professionals, Mississippi Chapter awarded the Junior League of Jackson with the Organizational Champion of Diversity Award. Accepting the award on behalf of the League was JLJ President Meredith Aldridge, who stated, "This award is a tangible reminder of the journey we have been on as an organization over the past few years that we hope—in fact, we know—is building a foundation for greater service, and a more meaningful impact on our members and our community."

SALES TAX EXEMPTION

Each January, the Junior League of Jackson visits the Mississippi State Capitol to share its mission and accomplishments with our state's elected leaders. This year, Capitol Day had a special focus—the passage of a sales tax exemption bill. With bipartisan support, the bill passed the legislature, and on April 24, 2019, members of the JLJ Board of Directors attended a signing by Gov. Phil Bryant of Senate Bill 2955. Effective July 1, 2019, Senate Bill 2955 adds the Junior League of Jackson to a list of nonprofit entities that are exempt from state sales tax.

The League estimates that sales tax exemption will result in an average annual savings of \$55,000-\$60,000, which the League plans to invest directly back into the community. "We commend Gov. Bryant and the Mississippi Legislature for the passage of Senate Bill 2955," said JLJ President Meredith Aldridge. "The tax savings will allow the League to expand existing community initiatives and explore new opportunities to serve."



Creating Connections Feedback Campaign

The Creating Connections Feedback Campaign was a multi-faceted opportunity for members to share feedback on a variety of governance and planning topics that affect the League and strengthen connections between members and planning. Feedback was used to implement the League's Strategic Plan and to plan for the future.

In preparation for year four of the five-year Strategic Plan, members were asked to share feedback on improved member engagement, sustainability of fund development efforts, and methods for effective community service. In keeping with the commitment to develop the potential of its members, the League solicited



feedback on the tools, information, and training needed for leadership development, as well as ideas for promoting openness and transparency in the nominating and leadership selection processes.

To engage members, the League provided a variety of mediums to solicit feedback, including an online survey, two town halls with members of the League's Board of Directors, and real-time questions at General Membership Meetings using members' mobile devices, which was particularly popular. As a result of the feedback campaign, the League made a number of updates to its practices, policies, and Strategic Plan. Most notably, for the 2019-2020 League year, members will move from an hours-based placement requirement to a completion-based requirement, which the League hopes will create a more positive, effective impact on its membership by valuing members' time and commitments while promoting efficiency in the League's commitments to its community partners. Additionally, the League started a members-only blog for increased and diversified communication with its membership.
