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Connecting Needs with Resources

Play, Eat, Learn

Parenting is no easy task, and resources can be less accessible for some. That is why we partner with University of Mississippi Medical Center's Center for the Advancement of Youth (CAY), the Mississippi Children's Museum, and St. Andrew's Episcopal School to provide a series of free parenting workshops.

We are thrilled to report that this year we moved the location of the project to the Mississippi Children's Museum and, by doing so, were able to double attendance. While League volunteers facilitated dinner and entertained children, parents and guardians listened to programs facilitated by CAY on children and ADHD, the science behind children's behavior, social media and relationships, and the importance of playtime.

Midtown Backpack & School Pantry Programs

According to the Mississippi Food Network, more than one in four Mississippi children go to bed hungry each night. Many students qualify for free or reduced lunch and breakfast, but when they leave school, their opportunities for nourishment virtually end. To combat childhood hunger for this group of young Mississippians, we partner with Mississippi Food Network to implement the Midtown Backpack and School Pantry Programs.

Each week JLJ volunteers meet at Mississippi Food Network to pack food for the weekend for approximately 200 students at Johnson and Smith Elementary Schools in the Jackson Public School District.

The School Pantry at Johnson Elementary School provides families with access to healthy nutrition throughout the school year. On the second Thursday of each month, JLJ volunteers work with Mississippi Food Network to stock shelves with shelf-stable foods as well as fresh produce. JLJ volunteers also plan programs each month that focus on nutrition and physical fitness.

I Read More with My Buddy

Elementary-age children benefit immensely from reading aloud to others. However, many parents struggle to find time to read with their children on a regular basis.

To help fill this gap, we partner with the Barksdale Reading Institute to provide one-on-one reading sessions at Oak Forest Elementary School. JLJ volunteers meet weekly with second and third graders who were reading below grade level when the school year began. The goal of the program is to improve fluency, vocabulary, and comprehension. Regular one-on-one interaction is key to the success of this program. Volunteers become role models for students as they encourage good reading habits, help develop vocabulary, and allow students to broaden their reading options.

Connecting Communities Day of Service

On January 21, 2019, Martin Luther King, Jr. Day, the Junior League of Jackson pulled together organizations and volunteers from across the Jackson metro area for our inaugural Connecting Communities Day of Service. More than 500 volunteers of all ages and backgrounds donated their time and energy to complete 10 simultaneous half-day service projects in our community.

Art from the Heart HeARTworks offers an artistic experience in a Christian environment to the homeless and needy in the community. Here, volunteers as young as 12 years old cleaned the art studio and stocked and organized the art supplies.

Keep Downtown Jackson Beautiful More than 75 teenage volunteers cleaned the neighborhood surrounding Stewpot, which included landscaping, disposing of garbage, and cleaning building exteriors.



Fill the Pie Volunteers donated toiletry items and school supplies for the Jackson Public Schools' Partners in Education (PIE) store. Additionally, volunteers sorted and packaged school supplies and uniforms.

Connecting Communities Day of Service

Power of Positivity Approximately 20 volunteers cleaned and painted the courtyard area outside the Jackson Public Schools District Office.

Revitalize West Jackson In partnership with Revitalize Mississippi, 30 volunteers helped clean and landscape vacant lots near the Rosemont Community Park so that the area can be later converted to landscaped community space.

Service from the Heart In partnership with HIS Heart Ministries, volunteers cleaned, painted, and decorated the hallways and doors of the children's wing at Calvary Baptist Church. They also organized the tutoring and supply closets and made the spaces more functional.



Thank You, First Responders Approximately 130 volunteers as young as 5 years old wrote thank-you notes to the community's first responders. Children and teenagers decorated and stuffed snack boxes and delivered them to police precincts and fire stations across Jackson.

Connecting with Our Members

While voluntarism and community service are the lifeblood of the Junior League of Jackson, developing the potential of our members and facilitating leadership and training opportunities are also at the heart of our mission.

The League offers a number of leadership and training opportunities for members each year through our Membership Training and Development programs, such as Yoga and Mindfulness, Organizing Your Life, Savvy Women Know Their Finances, and We are Movement Makers.

Our Emerging Leaders program allows those who are early in their League service to develop skills they will need to be future leaders in our organization. This year, 13 women were selected to participate in this focused leadership training.

This year, the League further affirmed its dedication to developing the potential of women by creating a board position for the express purpose of membership training, hosting two community roundtables, and soliciting member feedback through a targeted feedback campaign.

In June of 2018, we partnered with the Women's Foundation of Mississippi to offer the inaugural "She's on Board," a women's board training program open to all women in the community. The event was so successful that we will be holding the second annual "She's on Board" program June 21, 2019, at JLJ Headquarters.

Five years ago, the League transitioned from our storefront fundraiser, Bargain Boutique, and introduced a new fund development endeavor — Junior League Jumble — which it billed as "the ultimate rummage sale." Since then, the event has lived up to its reputation as a bargain hunter's paradise while raising thousands of dollars to support the work of the League.

With more than 1,000 tickets sold and total revenues over \$85,000, Jumble 2019 surpassed all expectations. Following the sale, the League's community partners were invited to take any leftover merchandise that might benefit them, and 14 community partners took advantage of this opportunity. Goodwill reported their highest sales in the days following their receipt of the Jumble merchandise.

TOUCH A TRUCK® JACKSON

March 29-30, 2019



For the sixth year in a row, JLJ volunteers transformed an average parking lot into an interactive, truck-filled wonderland for children from across the Jackson metropolitan area. On March 29-30, Touch A Truck® Jackson once again served as the intersection of make-believe and reality as children were given the opportunity to explore, climb, and touch emergency response vehicles, heavy machinery, and other equipment.

Touch A Truck® Jackson mixes education with play to provide children with a one-of-a-kind learning experience. This year, STREAM (science, technology, reading, engineering, art, and math) interactive stations were located throughout the event. Guests also enjoyed the return of the Reading & Arts

tent, which featured local celebrity readers throughout the day as well as a collaborative art project. Bricks 4 Kidz offered another hands-on activity that allowed visitors to focus on STEM concepts. Approximately 50 exhibitors provided hands-on opportunities for guests to "dig in" and create a memorable learning experience.

This year we also introduced Touch ATruck® UNPLUGGED, an event designed for those with noise sensitivities. Horns and sirens were silenced as JLJ volunteers welcomed approximately 130 guests for a sensory-friendly Touch A Truck experience.

One of the highlights of Touch A Truck® Jackson for our volunteers is Field Trip Friday, where local public-school students are invited to attend the event at no cost to their schools or families. More than 900 students, plus their teachers and chaperones, participated in this year's Field Trip Friday.

Thanks to the generous support of our corporate sponsors and community partners and our volunteers' countless hours of work, Touch A Truck® Jackson 2019 raised more than \$66,000.
