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#### letter from the

# President



The beginning of the 2021-2022 League year was fraught with unknowns. In fact, the start of the year took a turn with new variants of Covid, the highest case numbers to date, parking garages turned into hospitals, and constantly changing safety protocols. It was chaotic for our members, community partners, families, and friends. This changing landscape meant constantly shifting plans. But what we saw as an organization was an abundance of resilience. Our members rolled up their sleeves, used their creativity, and continued to serve. This year didn't look the same, but thanks to the dedication of our members and supporters, I must say that it looked incredible.

During the 2021-2022 League year, we worked to build upon the collective legacy of this great organization. We offered a hybrid year that connected our members

so that everyone could participate. This meant that we had virtual and in-person opportunities, and the Board of Directors and leadership teams worked hard to create safe environments while still serving the community. It wasn't easy, but the impact was huge!

We were able to execute and support over thirty community projects and initiatives this year. We packed backpacks full of food for children to take home for the weekend, served meals, stocked pantries, hosted trainings for families, read to students, comforted those in grief, played with those who are sick, and cheered on our front-line workers! We donated books, uniforms, crafts, and supplies. In fact, we donated over \$30,000 in additional community assistance funds on top of our project funds.

We also made two \$500,000 donations to community partners to help our city grow and support the impact areas of early literature, children's health, and social development. We hosted summer camps both in-person and virtually, held a completely free Community Farmer's Market with 350 attendees, and contributed over 55,000 volunteer hours to our community partners.

Membership needs were of great importance this year, so we concentrated on training and development opportunities as well as long-range planning. We conducted surveys and received feedback on what our members are looking to achieve with their JLJ experience. We then engaged in a long-term planning effort for the League and developed a new three-to-five-year strategic plan.

And if that wasn't enough, we also held three fantastic fund development events: Mistletoe Marketplace, Junior League Jumble, and Touch A Truck® Jackson! This year, we broke the League record for funds raised!

We are grateful for all that we accomplished and for our impact in Jackson this year. We are appreciative of the hard work of our members, the support of our sponsors, and commitment from our partners. As this year comes to an end, I want to say what an honor it has been to serve the Junior League of Jackson. I am so proud of what we achieved and am forever thankful for the continued service to our organization and community.

The Junior League of Jackson is an organization of women committed to promoting voluntarism, developing the potential of women and improving communities through the effective action and leadership of trained volunteers.





# JLJ Commits



## CHILDREN'S CENTER FOR CANCER AND BLOOD DISORDERS

The Children's of Mississippi team is planning an extensive expansion and renovation of the Center for Cancer and Blood Disorders. The goal is to provide Mississippi families with the very best care in a state-of-the-art space dedicated to pediatric cancer and blood disorders, while also providing the technology, equipment, and space for provider training and research.

The original cancer center opened in 1991 as the Children's Cancer Clinic and was the very first signature project of the Junior League of Jackson. The League began a \$2 million dollar campaign in the late 1980's to raise the construction funds ensuring Mississippi would have a state-of-the-art pediatric cancer facility. Now, over 30 years later, we are so pleased to contribute to the renovation of that original facility with a \$500,000 donation. The League is honored to be a part of advancing the family-centric care provided at the clinic. This renovation will provide hope and healing to so many Mississippi children and their families, and this directly aligns with the Junior League of Jackson's mission.

#### JACKSON PLANETARIUM RENOVATION

The Russell C. Davis Planetarium has been closed since April 2018 due to a roof leak and interior damage but is now scheduled to have its first full renovation in the last 40 years. The Planetarium renovation will ensure that Mississippi has a state-of-the-art facility for our youth and families. It will be a place that fosters learning, and development —a place for growth.



The Planetarium will tell Mississippi's story about space, science, and technology and educate Mississippi children in a manner that inspires them to become leaders in the industry and field of science. It promotes STEM learning and gives opportunity to our community. This aligns perfectly with the League's issue-based community impact areas of children's health, children's social development, and early literacy. The League is honored to contribute to the funding of this renovation with a \$500,000 donation.



#### MEMBERSHIP TRAINING AND DEVELOPMENT



With six sessions running from September 2021 to April 2022, our hour-long Membership Training and Development (MTD) workshops focused on an array of personal and professional development topics, plus League-specific learning opportunities. Subject matter this year emphasized belonging and inclusion, leadership skills, social and emotional intelligence, financial literacy, resume building, and interviewing skills. These trainings were held virtually this year, which proved to be a hit with attendance and allowed the MTD team to bring in national speakers.

One of our members' favorite speakers was Dr. Carmen April-Washington, who spoke about belonging and finding their place in JLJ. Dr. April-Washington lives in Nashville and is a native of Jackson. Her mother, Lonnie Hamlin-April, is a Sustaining member of JLJ and serves on the Diversity Equity and Inclusion Advisory Committee. The Junior League of Jackson is dedicated to comprehensive diversity and inclusion, and this interactive Zoom session was a great way for members to learn and grow together.

#### SHE'S ON BOARD

The Junior League of Jackson partnered with The Women's Foundation of Mississippi to host their *She's On Board* training program as a hybrid event this year. On April 1, 2022, around 100 women from the community joined both in-person at League Headquarters and online to learn about nonprofit board leadership. Women were able to hear from a variety of speakers from across the state and learned about nonprofit governance, finance, and the roles and expectations of board service. When women in the community thrive in leadership and service, our community feels the impact!








#### STRATEGIC PLAN

The process to develop a new JLJ Strategic Plan started in February 2021, and we are excited to share the final product, which membership voted to adopt at the May General Meeting.

This effort, led by Training & Organizational Development Vice President, Shalon Wansley, Strategic Planning Chair, Carmen Gross, and facilitated by strategic planning consultant, Dr. Rebecca Burdette, was multi-faceted and included participation from Active, Provisional, and Sustaining members, as well as community partners and corporate sponsors.

We offered surveys, held Zoom meetings, and hosted activities like a Strategic Planning Workshop at our October General Meeting. All these activities were designed to create a space to reflect on our perspectives related to JLJ, and to share honest thoughts on the challenges and opportunities members see facing JLJ in the next 3-5 years. We shared the first iteration of the plan as a draft at both our December Home Meetings and online and gave time for members to offer feedback. That feedback helped us hone the draft and create a clear, concise roadmap to guide our League and help us focus on key aspects that will elevate JLJ so that we may best serve our members and our community in future years.







The overarching goal of the 2022-2025 Strategic Plan is to strengthen our community within and beyond the Junior League of Jackson. We will do so by directing our time, energy, and resources on two priorities throughout the next 3-5 years: enrich our JLJ member community and maximize our impact.

The graphic on page 8 shows the seven areas of emphasis on which we will focus to

accomplish these goals. The incoming Board of Directors is currently creating an annual work plan with action items to see these goals come to life. Thank you to everyone who participated in our strategic planning journey; your input has been invaluable in developing a plan for a successful and sustainable League for our members and the Jackson community.

#### DIVERSITY, EQUITY, INCLUSION, AND BELONGING

New this year is the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Advisory Committee and DEI Chair and Co-Chair leadership positions. The Committee is comprised of League members with unique backgrounds and perspectives and a mutual commitment to expanding diversity, equity, and inclusion in JLJ and beyond. The Committee advises JLJ on best practices, concerns, long-term plans, development, and advancement of diversity, equity, and inclusion principles in the League.

Diversity, Equity, & Inclusion Chair, Torri Martin, and Co-Chair, Michelle Simon, spent the year researching curriculum and training opportunities for League members and working with leadership to ensure DEI principles are considered in membership and community matters. They also hosted the first DEI Advisory Committee meeting and organized a Leaguewide visit to the Mississippi Civil Rights Museum. Members in attendance were able to hear from museum staff before touring the museum together.

#### 2021-2022 PROVISIONAL CLASS

Provisional members began their training course virtually during their Super Saturday Retreat on April 24, 2021. The curriculum allowed those new to the League the opportunity to understand the impact areas of JLJ community projects, introduced the governing organization of our League, and developed relationship with fellow members. Congratulations to all of the women who completed the 2021-2022 Provisional Year!



Held at the Boys & Girls Club Capitol Unit complex, this free event provided fresh fruits and vegetables to the community of West Jackson as well as information on the benefits of healthy eating and exercise. Activities for both children and adults included a reading room with book give aways, a smoothie station, jump rope contest, seed planting lessons, cooking demonstrations, and a fun financial literacy project. Lunch was provided from local food trucks and over 350 guests attended! It was a special day that supported local businesses and growers, focused on food insecurity and education around healthy eating and exercise.

The Keystone Fund is the endowment fund for the Junior League of Jackson. It ensures that permanent funding exists to support the League's work. The ultimate objective is to grow a fund that will be substantial enough to help support the League in the event of a decline in sponsorships or a shortfall in the League's fund development businesses.

#### QUEEN OF THE PEARL

Have you noticed that a brightly painted larger-than-life sculpture is now displayed in the courtyard at Junior League Headquarters? This piece of Jackson history, given to the League by local businessman and friend of the League, Billy Boykin, was once part of the "Mississippi Catfish on Parade" art movement created by the Mississippi Commission for International Cultural Exchange in 2003. Local businesses and nonprofits were asked to sponsor one of 68 imported, fiberglass fish and decorate it with their own flare to be displayed throughout the downtown area to attract visitors and locals. After the exhibit was complete, the statues were auctioned and distributed to places all around Mississippi.



The JLJ courtyard catfish, rumored to have been named *Queen of the Pearl*, ended up at the farm of Billy Boykin. Once Billy saw that his colorful seven-foot long sculpture was painted and signed by renowned artist, Miriam Weems, he decided that the perfect home for his purchase would be at League Headquarters where he had seen several pieces of her artwork hanging there.

Miriam was a beloved member of the League. She was the 1963 Junior League of Jackson Carnival Ball Queen and a valuable volunteer in the Jackson community prior to her death in August of 2011. Miriam had been

so involved in community service that in 2004, she was chosen as the Junior League of Jackson Sustainer of the Year. She had been involved in the redevelopment of downtown Jackson and of her neighborhood, Belhaven, working particularly with updating Laurel Park. She served on the Board of the Mississippi Children's Museum, the Board of the Ballet Guild and helped start the Mississippi Arts Festival.

#### CAPITOL DAY

On January 25, 2022, volunteers attended Capitol Day at the Mississippi State Capitol to share information about the Junior League of Jackson and our positive impact in the community.

JLJ regularly attends this annual event as a tool to promote the importance of our organization. In fact, the Junior League of Jackson was granted sales tax exemption status in June of 2019 and Capitol Day was an important way to help us communicate that need with State Legislators. Today, League members continue to communicate the importance of that exemption to the financial health of our organization.



The Junior League of Jackson hopes to steadily grow the Keystone Fund through tax-deductible donations and tax-wise planned giving, including gifts made to the Keystone Fund through wills and estate planning. While certain giving levels have been designated for special recognition, there is no minimum donation. Gifts of any size are welcomed and appreciated!

Whether in person, virtual, or hybrid, our Community Projects worked with our partners to identify needs and made a significant and measurable impact this year! #### JACKSON BACKPACK AND SCHOOL PANTRY PROGRAMS

Mississippi Food Network/Jackson Public Schools

This project is divided into two components. Backpack volunteers provided approximately 200 students at Smith and Johnson Elementary Schools with a backpack meal kit filled with nutritious food to take home each weekend during the school year. Volunteers packed backpacks on Friday mornings and were responsible for delivering backpacks to the schools. Pantry volunteers stocked the school pantry at Pecan Park Elementary School with fresh produce, staple food, and personal care items. Volunteers also hosted a distribution event at the school pantry throughout the school year.
